* <u>Hinemihi O Au Tawhito</u> (Hinemihi of the Old World) is one of only four antique Maori Meeting Houses to be found outside of New Zealand - and the only one to be seen in the open air. She originally stood in the tiny settlement of Te Wairoa, near Rotorua, and was one of only a few wooden buildings left standing following the eruption of volcanic Mr. Tarawera in June 1886. She was brought to Clandon Park in Surrey in 1892 by William Hillier, the 4th Earl of Onslow, at the end of his term of office as Governor of New Zealand. In April of this year Hinemihi will have 'lived' under the sky at Clandon Park for 122 wet and cold English seasons and is now in urgent need of restoration. It is the joint vision of the National Trust and Te Maru O Hinemihi to eventually use Hinemihi as a Whare-wānanga – a house of learning - for UK-based Maori people and local community groups of all kinds and all ages in Surrey and surrounding counties.

Te Maru O Hinemihi (In the Embrace of Hinemihi) is a National Trust 'friends group' who have taken on the task of creating an agenda for Hinemihi's restoration programme. It is made up of volunteers from different backgrounds and professions including academics and others working in academia, an architect, business people, a performance artist, a writer, an artist (who is also an Anglican Minister), a professional weaver and teacher - and a Maori heritage expert who also happens to be the great-grandson of the man who originally carved Hinemihi back in New Zealand in 1881. At the moment we are not seeking people with skills in building, painting or woodwork. But as soon as funds are raised to restore Hinemihi we will need plenty of voluntary help in this area. What we need right now is people with experience in fund raising, liaising with corporate organisations and event organisation/management. Interested?
